

Winery TerraQuiglia



The company is located in the Municipality of Guiglia at about 450 meters above sea level in the province of Modena. His name wants to be a tribute to the origins: Terra Aquilia was the ancient name of Guiglia, a town of Roman origins placed on a hill overlooking the course of the Panaro and much of the plain. Area rich in vegetation and biodiversity where natural beauties stand out such as the Sassi di Roccamalatina regional park, splendid villages and historical monuments such as the

castle known as "Il Conventino" and the Romanesque parish church of Trebbio.

Its vineyards were planted in 2003 on an area of about 6 hectares, while the winery was born in 2008.

The owner, Romano Mattioli, wanted and designed it for those who love strictly natural wine, recovering the production methods of the past integrated with new technologies to guarantee their quality.

All operations are carried out with extreme respect for the natural laws, limiting at the most every alteration, both in the vineyards, where the rules of organic farming are observed, and in the cellar, in the entire wine-making process.

In respect of eco-sustainability, the company has a photovoltaic system that covers the entire energy needs and recovers rainwater for use in agriculture.

The cellar makes wine exclusively from its own grapes so that the wines are an authentic expression of the territory of origin. It produces about 65,000 bottles of various types ranging from Lambrusco to Cabernet to Malbo Gentile, to delicate white and rosé wines with natural refermentation in the bottle, up to sparkling and sparkling wines. Organic wines, healthy and natural therefore, but also the expression of a virtuous relationship with the land from which they come.

"As producers of natural wine, we want to give wine lovers a product that, in addition to quality, brings with it all that world of aromas, scents and emotions that can be preserved and enhanced only with the productive methods of our tradition. the wine cheers up the heart of the man, the Latins said, and behind every bottle there is an ancient story ".
