Chi-med's Fruquintinib Receives Positive CHMP Opinion For Advanced Colorectal Cancer

Hutchmed announced that the Committee for Medicinal Products for Human Use of the European Medicines Agency (CHMP) adopted a positive opinion recommending the granting of a marketing authorization for Fruquintinib. The oral, selective inhibitor of VEGFR-1, -2, and -3 is intended for the treatment of adult patients with metastatic colorectal cancer who have been previously treated. **(China Daily)**

EAEU Suspends Anti-Dumping Duties on Chinese Titanium Dioxide Pending Review

The Eurasian Economic Commission launched a changed circumstances review into anti-dumping duties on Chinese titanium dioxide. Importantly, existing anti-dumping duties on pigment-grade titanium dioxide are suspended during the investigation period. The decision temporarily relieves cost pressures for major Chinese manufacturers, while the Commission re-evaluates market conditions and trade measures. **(ChemNet Chemical Headlines)**

China Issues Strict Guidelines to Curb Industrial Wastewater Risks

Eight Chinese government agencies, including the Ministry of Ecology and Environment, jointly issued guidelines to strengthen industrial wastewater risk controls and safeguard agricultural water. The policy tightens approvals for chemical projects near farmlands, upgrades industrial park treatment infrastructure, and enhances law enforcement against illegal toxic and heavy-metal discharges. **(ChemNet Chemical Headlines)**

China Cracks Down on Food Additive Misuse with Over 23,000 Cases

China's market regulation authorities have investigated over 23,600 cases involving the excessive and unauthorized use of food additives since April 2025. Total fines and confiscations reached €18.61 million (145 million yuan), with 278 cases transferred to police. The nationwide crackdown targeted key categories including preservatives, synthetic colorants, and artificial sweeteners across major food sectors. **(ChemNet Chemical Headlines)**
